FOREWORD

I am delighted to present the 95th Annual Report for the year 2020-21 of Andhra University highlighting the key achievements.

Andhra University, one of the prestigious top-level multi-disciplinary Universities in the Country, was established in 1926. It was nurtured by visionaries and has immensely contributed to the cause of quality academics. The University is committed in imparting value based education to students through innovative pedagogy and state-of-art research facilities and crossed many milestones in its 95 years glorious journey. Recognizing its quality pursuits, the



University was graded by NAAC at "A" with a CGPA of 3.60 on Four Point Scale and also got ISO 9001:2015 certification. In the NIRF ranking frame work 2021, Andhra University stood at 24th among Indian Universities. This prominent University is marching towards it scentennial celebrations in 2026.

Post COVID-19 pandemic, this University is moving forward from a smalldisruption to progression. All the classes and examinations are being conducted in blended mode. Many actionable points/ recommendations of the NEP (National Education Policy) have already been complied at Andhra University. One of actionable point in NEP is to establish MERUs (Multi-Disciplinary Education and Research University) and to strengthen existing departments in Languages, Literature, Music, Philosophy, Art, Dance, Theatre, YOGA, Mathematics, Statistics, Pure and Applied Sciences, Sociology, Economics, Sports etc. During this academic year, the University inked several MoUs with various organizations in the areas of student and faculty exchange. The establishment of AP Higher Education and Planning Board (APHEPB) which aims at strengthening inter institutional relationships and to promote global standard research facilitated the collaboration with the Institutions of national importance such as IIM-Visakhapatnam, IIPE, etc., in the University regional cluster. Launched AU School of International Business with international BBA-MBA, 5 year integrated course partnering with IIM Visakhapatnam. This university has collaborated with US Consulate to establish the 'American Corner', which would be the third centre in the country, will go a long way in bridging the skill gap and also supporting students to study abroad in the best universities. Few more collaborations with Premier entities viz., STPI, BSNL, ICSI, INCOIS, NASSCOM for advancing research through setting up of state-of-the-art equipped laboratories, research centres and to create skilled workforce to cater the needs of today's Industry. A powerful digital campus is being architectured for interconnecting all departments using latest GPON (Gigabit Ethernet Passive Optical Network). The development of physical infrastructure activity in the campus is being carried out on a war-footing basis. E-Class Rooms, Research Labs, Marine Skill & Entrepreneur Laboratory, Incubation Centre, Centre of Excellence in IoT, new hostel buildings such as Sivajipalem Hostel, SC & ST students Hostel, Pharmacy Girls Hostel, a new hostel block in AU College of Engineering for Women, etc., are getting ready to accommodate our students and some more hostel blocks are also being renovated.

The University is tapping substantial financial assistance from various funding agencies such as UGC, DST, DBT, CSIR, ICAR, DAE, BARC, MoEF etc. for undertaking advanced level research projects and for organizing various national and international seminars, conferences and workshops, etc.,

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1. University at a Glance

Andhra University is one of the oldest educational institutions in India established in 1926 by the Madras University Act to cater to the northern districts of the erstwhile Madras Presidency. The University was the first to be conceived as a residential multi-disciplinary University, which also served as a residential, teaching-cum-affiliating University. The University is a trendsetter in Higher Education and University-Administration in many respects. In 2016, the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) of India has reaccredited Andhra University with an "A" Grade with a CGPA of 3.60, on a four point scale, until 2023. The University secured ISO 9001:2000 certification in 2016, and at present certified as ISO 9001:2015 for its quality standards and maintenance of the same.

Andhra University, a premier institute of higher learning, is offering variety of courses in has a direct impact on the emerging areas that has a direct impact on the economic growth and development of the society. The University has distinguished itself by inaugurations several courses which are innovative and first of their kind in the country. The University has seven constituent colleges – A.U. College of Arts & Commerce, A.U. College of Science & Technology, A.U. College of Engineering (Autonomous), A.U. College of Pharmaceutical Sciences, Dr.B.R.Ambedkar College of Law, A.U. College of Engineering for Women, Institute of Advanced Studies in Education (IASE) and A.U. School of Distance Education. Besides, the University has 20 departments offering twenty four courses at UG level; sixty nine departments offering one hundred and nineteen courses at PG level and Ph.D programmes. In addition, the University has 13 Research centres and one Advanced Analytical Lab which is recognised as a National Facility. The University has achieved another distinction recently, by imparting education in allied fields, through Certificate programmes to Defence personnel of Tri-Forces through a MoU with DGR, GOI.

2. Genesis and Growth


Ever since its inception in 1926, Andhra University has an impeccable record of catering to the educational needs of the Andhra region, in the erstwhile British Raj. The University is not just one of the oldest educational institutions in the country, but is also the first to be conceived as a residential and teaching-cum-affiliating University, mainly devoted to postgraduate teaching and research. The people of the State have a deep emotional attachment to the institution, since it came into being after a prolonged struggle of the Telugu people for a University in the educationally-backward northern districts of the erstwhile Madras Presidency.

Andhra University was constituted by the Madras Act of 1926. The 95 years-old institution is fortunate to have Sir C.R. Reddy as its founder Vice-Chancellor, Former President of India, Dr.SarvepalliRadhakrishnan, was the successive Vice-Chancellor, who strengthened the University with his impeccable planning and vision. Besides, over time, several visionaries and Vice-Chancellors were instrumental in strengthening this Magnificent University. The University started its research academic programme in 1936, with six students assisted by a handful of teachers. The strength of the students increased to 17 in the second year. The student strength rose to 2800 in 1966 and at present to 12,000 mark. The University is spread on a sprawling campus of 531.0 acres dotted with 121 buildings of Academic, Administrative and support services with a plinth area of about 20 lakhs sq.ft., and 324 staff quarters. At present, the University is catering mostly to the Educational needs of Visakhapatnam, and Vizianagaram, beside students from other parts of India and the world. There are **376** affiliated colleges spread across five districts under the territorial jurisdiction of Andhra University. The enrolment in Affiliated Colleges is more than one lakh.

Since the day of its inception, the University is maintaining its tradition of meeting global interface. The University has developed network with industry, business, NGOs and Government organizations. Many academic departments take up consultancy works in the form of projects, training, advisory, counselling, design, and so on. The University has established a University Development Centre to coordinate consultancy services and to act as liaison between the University and the client. The natural beauty of the campus with the serene blue waters of the Bay of Bengal on one side and the lush green Kailasagiri Hill on the other provides the right academic ambience, most conducive to learning.

Thus, with all the 95 years of its existence, individual achievements and positions occupied by the faculty and alumni, academic achievements, research output coupled with initiating new innovative courses, centres and institutes for the first time in the country, Andhra University has an impeccable record of catering to the educational needs and addressing the sociological problems of the region. It is relentless in its efforts in maintaining standards in teaching and research, ensuring proper character building and development among the students, encouraging community developmental programmes, nurturing leadership and patriotism in young men and women and imbibing a sense of responsibility to become responsible and responsive citizens of the country, while striving for excellence in all fronts. Whole vision as on educationist proved to be technical in the long run.

AUCE(A): The Andhra University College of Engineering (Autonomous) is one of the most reputed Engineering Colleges in the country which offers 16 UG, 33 PG and 10 Integrated(B.Tech + M.Tech) programmes in 15 departments. Courses like Civil Engineering, Chemical Engineering, Computer Science, Electronics & Communications, Architecture, Mechanical Engineering, Remote Sensing, Marine Engineering, Naval Architecture, Nanotechnology, Artificial Intelligence, Bioinformatics and Biomedical Engineering have made a mark for themselves. Every department offers several specialisations which are on par with industry standards.

AUCE(W): A.U. College of Engineering for Women was established in 2010 with a total intake of 240 in four branches of Engineering, viz., Computer Engineering, Electronics & Communication Engineering, Electrical & Electronics Engineering and Mechanical Engineering @ 60 students per each branch.Later B.Tech.in Civil Engineering with an intake of 60 students and B.Tech. + M.Tech. integrated courses in CSE, EEE, ECE, Mechanical and Civil engineering with an intake of 30 students in each department, were also started by the college. Until now 8 batches have been successfully relieved with an average placement of 75%-80%. A few students have got admitted into IIM's, M.S and higher studies in various institutes of repute. The departments strive to excel in the overall development of the students by conducting various events locally and at National level.

College of Law: Law College was established in Andhra University in the year 1945 in order to meet a long felt need for a College of Law in this part of the country, which was then a part of the province of Madras. It must be said that the College owes its genesis to the farsightedness and wisdom of Dr.C.R.Reddy, the founder Vice-Chancellor of this University, who, in consultation with Jurists like Sri Lionel Leach, Chief Justice of Madras, Sri P.V.Rajamannar, the then Advocate General of Madras, Sri V.Govindarajachari, Advocate and a few others, laid its foundations. In a message which he gave on the occasion of the formal inauguration of the College by Sri P.V.Rajamannar, Judge of the Madras High Court, on 4th August, 1945 at Machilipatnam, Dr. Reddy emphasized the need for enriching the Academic study of law in the Universities as contrasted with the mere training for forensic practice. He visualized this institution as a centre for comparative and interdisciplinary study of Law, feeding the stream of national life with teachers and juries consults as well as practicing lawyers.

The College started functioning from 4th July, 1945 in a private building in Machilipatnam, belonging to one Sri Janaki Ram Naidu. At that time the University was at Guntur due to exigencies of the Second World War. For about a fortnight, Sri K.V. Gopalaswamy, M.A., (Oxon) Bar-at-Law, was "Interim Professor-in-charge". In July, 1949 the College was shifted to the University Campus at Waltair. Since then the college had outstanding jurists and Legal Luminaries as the Members of the Faculty such as the venerated Prof. S.Venkataraman, Prof. G.C.V.SubbaRao, Prof. V. Balasubrahmaniam, Prof. D.GopalakrishnaSastry, Prof A.S.RamachandraRao, Prof. V. LakshmanaRao Prof. B.S.Murty, all of who also are no more, Prof. K.Gupteswar (Retired) among others. The College which was for quite a long time was part of Department of Arts, Commerce and the Law College, has been rechristened as a separate College of Law on 14th April, 1989. As a mark of respect towards the great son of India and chief architect of the Constitution of India Dr.Bhima Rao Ramji Ambedkar, the College has been renamed as Andhra University, Dr.B.R.Ambedkar College of law with effect from 10-05-1991.

Hailed as one of the premier Institutes of legal educational Institute in the country, this college can boast of such distinguished and eminent personalities as Justice K.RamaSwamy, former Judge, Supreme Court of India, Justice Jasti Chelameswar, Judge, Supreme Court of India, (Retd) Justice Amareswari, Judge (Retd.) A.P. High Court, Justice Immaneni Panduranga Rao, Judge, A.P. High Court, Justice N.D.Patnaik, Judge, A.P. High Court, Justice P. Ramakrishna Raju, Judge A.P. High Court, Shri P.S.Rao, Member, International Law Commission, Sri D. Manmohan, Vice President, Income Tax Appellate Tribunal, ShriR.Rangaiah, Member, Income Tax Appellate Tribunal, Dr.M.Gopalakrishna Reddy, former Vice-Chancellor, Andhra University, Prof. Y.C.Simhadri, former Vice-Chancellor, Banaras Hindu University Patna University, AcharyaNagarjuna University and Andhra University, Late Sri B.Krishna Mohan, former Member UPSC and Sri G.V.G.Krishna

Murthy, former Election Commissioner, Late Sri D.V.SubbaRao, Chairman Bar Council of India, Sri P.P. Rao Senior Advocate, Supreme Court of India as its alumni among others.

In Public life also the College has such distinguished alumni as ShriK.Yerram Naidu, former Union Minister, (Late) Sri. G.M.C.Balayogi, former Hon'ble Speaker, LokSabha, Sri M.Venkaiah Naidu, former Hon'ble Union Minister for Rural Development and former president, Bharatheeya Janata Party and the present Hon'ble Vice President of India. At present this college has some of its distinguished alumni as sitting judges (Justice. T. Rajani, Justice D.V.S.S. Somayajulu and Justice B. Devanand) in Andhra Pradesh High Court and a number of its former students in the subordinate judiciary in Andhra Pradesh.

To the credit of the Law College, Indian Law Institute, New Delhi conducted its Annual Conference in 1975 in the College Campus. The distinguished participants in this conference are Prof. Upendra Baxi, Ms. Alice Jacob and Prof. R.V.R. ChandrasekharaRao.

The Law College celebrated its Decennial in the year 1957. Justice Kanda Bhimasankaram and Tenneti Viswanadham (Chairman, Advisory Commission, Company Law Administration, Government of India) were the Chief Guests who presided at the Decennial celebration in the grounds opposite the Law College (Arts College)Building. The Law College was only a Department of Law along with other Departments in the University Arts College. In 1972 the Law College (Dept. of Law) celebrated its Silver Jubilee. Justice O.Chinnappa Reddy. (S.C.Judge) was Chief Guest. Now, the 75 year (Platinum Jubilee) is being celebrated. The Law College has been fortunate in more than one way.

College of Pharmaceutical Sciences: The first priority of A.U. College of Pharmaceutical Sciences is always for striving to improve the teaching and learning process and the academic year 2020-2021 was no exception for the same. The teachers assisted with research scholars who were mostly fellowship holders of UGC, ICMR, CSIR and DST and other members included under temporary teaching arrangements successfully executed this task by imparting quality education to B. Pharm, Pharm D and M. Pharm students. Few of the B.Pharm students were employed by the industry and majority of the outgoing B.Pharm students joined M.Pharm at Andhra University and other colleges. Some of the B.Pharm students are pursuing their PG courses at premier institutes like NIPER. Pharm.D students graduated from the college joined as clinical pharmacists in hospitals like CARE, APOLLO, Seven Hills etc. The M.Pharm students mostly joined in industry and regulatory affairs.

The teachers in this college are well known for their academic, research activities and received awards. In 2021, A.P. Council for Science and Technology (APCOST), Govt. of Andhra Pradesh awarded Dr. K. Eswar Kumar with AP Scientist award. Pindiproli Latika, BhoganTruptiPrakash, KilariMounika and KKVVL Mani Teja of IV B. Pharm, III B. Pharm, II B Pharm and I B Pharm respectively were awarded with Ramanbhai Patel scholarship worth Rs.25.000/per year from Indian Pharmaceutical Association, Mumbai. An international webinar was conducted on 29th Sep 2020 on the eve of superannuation of Prof. K.V. Ramana Murthy and was attended by about 1000 delegated from all over India. Eminent speakers were invited for giving plenary lectures like Prof. SrikumaranMelethil, University of Missouri, USA, Prof. Chandra SekharKolli, California Health Science University, USA, Prof. S.K. Jain, Sagar University, MP and Meka Lingam, Vice President, Lee Pharma, Visakhapatnam. A free webinar was organized in association with Clinic India, Hyderabad on 22ndMay 2021, about 500 students from our institute and from affiliated colleges have participated. Dr. K. Eswar Kumar and Dr. AKM Pawar attended 11th National IPA Students Congress -2020 during 28th & 29th Feb 2020. Organized National Webinar series on Industrial Approach-Pharmaceutical Analytical techniques (IPAT-2021) on every 2nd or 4th Saturday from February-July 2021. Some of our Pharm.D students participated in COVID vaccination program.

Most of our faculty delivered lectures at webinars organized by the national societies, bodies and various institutions sponsored by AICTE, DST etc. during the academic year. Teacher counsellors were appointed for each year of B.Pharm. and Pharm.D. courses and these counsellors monitored the progress of the students and also collected feedback from the students relating the academic and other activities of the college. Based on the inputs, necessary corrective measures were implemented. For IV B.Pharm students, GPAT awareness classes and training programmes were conducted.

Meetings at regular intervals were conducted to enhance awareness on anti-ragging and on women empowerment. Students of AU College of Pharmaceutical Sciences are strong in practical skills, because they work tirelessly in the laboratories and learn under the expert care and supervision of their teachers.

More number of foreign students and NRIs joined A.U. College of Pharmaceutical Sciences during the academic year 2020-21 in B.Pharm, Pharm.D., M.Pharm. and Ph.D. courses from countries like Nepal, USA, Canada and South Africa which indicates its popularity as a quality institution imparting education in pharmacy. About 50 Ph.D. degrees were awarded and about 100 papers were published in referred journals.

IASE: The Institute of Advanced studies in Education (IASE) offers a two years B.Ed. & M.Ed. Programmes. The total number of students pursuing B. Ed course is 200 with 100 in First year & 100 in the 2^{nd} year. The institute also offers M. Ed course with 50 in the 1^{st} year & 50 in the 2^{nd} year. Apart from the regular teaching refresher programmes, Workshops are conducted for in service teachers working in schools and faculty from DIETs and Colleges of Education. We have Dissertation for M.Ed. students.

SDE: The School of Distance Education has been functioning effectively catering to the educational needs of employees, housewives and such as those who are interested in improving their qualifications in different disciplines, thus making Higher Education accessible to everyone. It offers programmes under UG, PG and certification programmes through distance mode. After COVID-19, SDE is planning to start UG & PG courses in online mode for which the administration is making efforts by improving the infrastructure.



1. Students Enrolled in the University During the Academic Year 2020-21


Andhra University, being a State University, follows all the rules and regulations of the State Government in the admission process. As a public organization, the University keeps open all the admission information and makes the admission process truly transparent. The admissions are based on the eligibility qualification and the ranks secured by the candidates in the Common Entrance Test. Admission into all UG and PG courses of Engineering, Pharmacy, MBA, MCA, B.Ed., B.Ed. (Special Education), M.Ed., M.Ed. (Special Education), Law will be done by the State Government based on the ranks obtained in the respective common entrance tests along with minimum prescribed eligibility criteria in the respective qualifying examination as stipulated by the State Government. Notification for admissions to different PG courses of Arts & Science and Diploma courses are done through Andhra University Common Entrance Test (AUCET) under the supervision of Directorate of admissions. Results are published through Andhra University website and the students are facilitated to download rank cards from the website. Counselling for admission into different PG courses in the campus colleges as well as affiliated PG colleges will be done through a centralized process.

A total of 3927 students have been admitted into various UG, PG, Integrated and Ph. D, courses for the academic year 2020-2021 as shown in the adjacent graph. There is a slight increase in the number of admissions and the Ph.D admissions shows the importance the administration has given for research.




2. Seminar/Conference/Workshops Organized & Attended During the Academic Year 2020-21 :



As part of these publications, the University brings out five Journals in Advanced Sciences, Engineering Technology, Pharmaceutical Sciences, Law, Arts, Commerce and Management Studies. The University developed a structured plan for Research collaboration with reputed R & D organizations by way of entering into MoU's to have access to high technology laboratories and practical environment for experimentation. 5. Extension, Outreach & Student Activities







2. Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC):



10. Central Facilities

1. **Dr. V.S. Krishna Library** has 60,000 sq. ft. (5574.18 sq. m.) of Carpet area. Besides the work and stock areas, each section has seating and reading facility to enable the users to choose and refer to the books comfortably. All the rooms are spacious with good ventilation. According to the need and convenience, one finds different seating arrangements. The seating arrangement is user friendly. To provide sufficient scope for optimum interaction among the users a seminar/group discussion room is provided. At a time 500 users can be seated in the library. The library is kept open on all days in the year including Sundays, except on national holidays and on days declared as holiday by the University. The library works in three shifts.

The Engineering College Library situated in the North Campus has a plinth area of 8,000 sq. ft. (743.22 sq. m.) with a seating capacity of 150. Dr. B.R. Ambedkar Law College situated in South Campus has a plinth area of 3400 sq. ft. (315.87 sq. m.) with a seating capacity of 61.

The library is effectively using SOUL software. Special facilities are provided for differently abled persons. A separate unit of books in Braille has been developed for visually challenged students. Reprographic facilities are provided.

- 2. Agro Economic Research Centre (1968) Agro-Economic Research Centre, Andhra University, Visakhapatnam is one of the 15 Centres set up by Directorate of Economics and Statistics, Ministry of Agriculture & Farmers Welfare, Government of India, to carry out research in agricultural economics in the states of Andhra Pradesh, Telangana and Odisha. It was established on 21st February, 1968. The Centre has opened portals of research in agriculture and rural development. It has endeavoured on several research areas which are very essential to policy formulation for Government of India, Government of Andhra Pradesh, Government of Telangana and Government of Odisha. Thus it has played a crucial role in the Policy formulation of agricultural and rural development for nearly five decades.
- 3. Centre for Studies on Bay of Bengal (2004) The Andhra University, having realized the importance of natural resources of the coastal, near and off shore environments, climatic conditions, marine food and agricultural products, aqua culture and placers of the Bay of Bengal region, has established an advanced research center exclusively to study the Bay of Bengal and its environs. The Center as per the resolutions of the EC of Andhra University was initiated in June 2004 in the erstwhile glass technology laboratory building.
- 4. Centre for NANO Technology (2001) Centre for Nanotechnology is a Research and Development Centre situated at A.U. College of Engineering (A), Andhra University. Centre is having Research facilities worth around 5 crores and providing testing facilities to the colleges, Industries, Defence Laboratories throughout in A.P. Centre for Nanotechnology is inaugurated on May 15th, 2011. Andhra University College of Engineering (A) possesses a vision to foster the development of research and education in the cutting edge technologies, multi-disciplinary, transdisciplinary all Inter-disciplinary areas like nanotechnology by developing human resources gifted with leading-edge competitive technologies required for meeting the future challenges and augmenting academic partnerships with industry. It also offers M.Tech course in the stream of Nanotechnology. The faculty of the Centre, drawn from different departments as a Guest faculty for Centre for Nanotechnology and is actively involved in research in the area of nanotechnology. The Infrastructure development in the Centre is started with year 2010 with the support of U.G.C.(MHRD) funds. This centre is also supported with the Centre of Excellence (CoE)in the year 2012 with the support of five Crores. This centre is established under TEQIP Phase II CoE (Centre of Excellence) entitled"Challenges of Nanotechnology for 21st Century Generation: Indian perspective in global scenario" in the year 2012 with the following thematic areas: i) Multiscale Composites ii) Nano lubricants, Machining & Thin films, iii) Nano Composites iv) PEM Fuel Cells

- 5. **Delta Studies Institute (June 1997)** Delta Studies Institute was established in the year 1997 with funding support from the ONGC and OIDB. Delta Studies Institute is conducting M. Tech Petroleum Exploration and Production programme and carrying out consultancy projects for ONGC.
- 6. The Centre for Gandhian Studies (2004) "I do not want my house to be walled in on all sides and my windows and doors to be stuffed. I want the cultures of all lands to be blown about my house as freely as possible.." Mahatma Gandhi's life represents a remarkable journey and personal transformation from a shy, young lawyer in South Africa to the venerated, fearless liberator of India from British rule. Gandhi while advocating the universal principle of love also practiced it in his every day life. For Gandhi, all means and ends should be infused with love and respect for fellow beings. While practising and preaching this principle of means and ends matter, he never took any short-cuts to achieve his goal. His concepts of non-violence, satyagraha influenced many world leaders. The life and teachings of Mahatma Gandhi have lasting impact especially on the humanity of modern age. His life bears a living testimony upholding human values. The modern world is passing through the critical phase. People are living in a society of war, terrorism, inequality and injustice. The Gandhi technique of non-violence offers the most effective remedial measure to all evils. It also promotes equality, reverence for life, mutual trust, social justice and universal brotherhood. In view of the significance and applicability of Gandhi's Philosophy and the profound impact he made on the 21st century, there is a need to uphold the values and ideals of Gandhi and make the students better acquainted with his thought and be enthused to take up research on Gandhi. The UGC has sanctioned Gandhian Studies Centre to Andhra University during the Xth Plan to propagate Gandhian ideals among students, staff and the general public and conduct research on Gandhism. The Centre is housed in the Social Sciences Block and it was inaugurated on 2nd October 2004 by Prof. V.L. Kulandiai Swamy, the Chief Guest of Gandhi Jayanthi Celebration 2004 in the presence of Prof. Y.C. Simhadri, the then Vice-Chancellor who made relentless efforts to have the Centre in this University. Objectives: • To propagate social and political ideas of Mahatma Gandhi and other great leaders of Indian freedom movement to students and other members of the society. • To conduct research on the political and economic ideas of Gandhi, Indian Freedom Movement, Panchayati Raj and Rural Development and other issues which were dear to Mahatma Gandhi. • To publish books, booklets and articles on Mahatma Gandhi, Indian Freedom Movement and Rural Development. • To conduct short term and long term courses, workshops, symposiam, seminars and orientation programmes to various target groups on different dimensions of Gandhian Thought. • To establish a documentation center and library on Gandhian Philosophy and related subjects. • To analyze and interpret the relevance of Gandhian Philosophy and apply it to contemporary problems. Library: The centre has more than 900 books written by Gandhi and on Gandhi. The books are issued to the scholars, teachers and students
- 7. The Centre for Population Research Studies (1978)The Population Research Centre, Andhra University, Visakhapatnam (sponsored by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Government of India, New Delhi) was established in 1978 in Andhra University to undertake research on various demographic, social and economic aspects of population growth in Andhra Pradesh. This Centre also undertakes independent and indepth evaluation of the Family Welfare Programmes in



Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, Odisha, West Bengal and Andaman & Nicobar Islands. It is a centre where the Research Staff are well qualified and experienced in survey research. Under the policy of improving the technical skills of its staff members which is encouraged by the funding agency, our staff members of PRC have undergone the Certificate Course in Population Studies (CPS) and Master of Population Studies (MPS) Course at International Institute for Population Sciences (IIPS), Mumbai. Under the National Family Health Survey (NFHS) which is also intended to improve the survey research capabilities of the staff of the Population Research Centres, the Research Staff members of the Centre got trained in various workshops organised in India and abroad and are familiar with the use of different software packages.

- 8. Dr. Durgabai Deshmukh Centre for Women's Studies (1987) Academic : M.A Women's Studies IV Semester (2019-21) batch has been completed the course in July 2021.

- 10. AU-APSSDC- Siemens Centre of Excellence is initiated to impact skill development in youth and increase employability.
- 11. Advanced Analytical Laboratory- A National facility (2009) was established to help faculty and scholars to carry out globally competitive R&D in basic and applied sciences, which is recognised as National Facility under DST-PURSE Programme.
- 12. Centre for Cyber Security and Data Analytics at Andhra University (2016) is a facility set up in A.U. for conducting training programs and workshops with hands-on experience with the thrust area being Information Security and Data Analytics.
- 13. **Prof. K. Satchidananda Murty Centre for Religious Studies** offers student / Ph.D. Scholar exchange program in the area of religious studies, to conduct national seminars on the same.
- 14. **Computer Centre** is to provide complete, latest and cost-effective solution to all IT enabled activities in the University. Besides, there is an extensive effort to provide a central computing facility with Network Server for all the students as well as staff of the University to provide Internet and Wifi facility.
- 15. **Dr. B. R. Ambedkar Study Centre** was established to study and research on the ideologies of Dr. B.R. Ambedkar in student community. The centre is sanctioned by DAF, Ministry of Social Justice.
- 16. **The Japanese Information & Study Centre**: The Japan Information and Study centre is the first being set up by Mitsubishi Corporation in a University in the country by the then Au authorities and the then managing director of Mitsubishi Corporation India Pvt. Ltd., Mr Masakazu Sakakida on December 14, 2015. The centre was supported financially by the Mitsubishi Corporation as part of its corporate social responsibility to the tune of Rs 27 lakhs for the year 2015-2016.

The purpose of the centre is to promote Japanese language and culture as India and Japan share their oriental culture as well as healthy traditions. The centre houses many artifacts of Japan in the study room and the class room to reflect Japanese culture, and many items like samurai, Kokeshi and Geisha dolls adorn the study room. Even the class room is furnished with wooden chairs, air-conditioners while cultural items of Japan have been embellished on the walls. These apart, several books have been kept in the study room for the Japanese learners. One ad hoc faculty is appointed to teach the Japanese diploma course to the students.

The admission into the 6-month diploma course begins in August every year. The admissions are made by the Directorate of Admissions of the Andhra University, located in the Vijayanagar Pedawaltair notification Palace. every year, and a is given in the website, www.andhrauniversity.edu.in. The director of the centre can be contacted on the email: japaninfoau@gmail.com. The classes are conducted thrice a week, i.e. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

- 17. **NMR Research Centre** : Nuclear Magnetic Resonance (NMR) is a crucial analytical instrument for qualitative and quantitative analysis of organic compounds. NMR research center in Andhra University is established as a central facility in the year 2013. At this research center is utilized by researchers in the fields of chemistry, pharmacy, microbiology, botany and biotechnology. Here in NMR research center majorly services are offered to elucidate structure of unknown organic compounds of natural and synthetic origin. Further, newer methods are evolved for qualitative and quantitative analysis of a select organic compound in a complex mixture. Along with academicians in Andhra University and several other institutes in AP and other regions, many of the pharmaceutical industries in Visakhapatnam are utilizing services of this center.
- 18. Centre for Defence studies : The Centre for Defence Studies has been established with the objectives of providing training to defence personnel and promoting Andhra University- Defence joint educations programmes. Under this programme, INS Viswakarma has been recognised as an affiliating institution for the award of B.Sc. (Hons) Degree in Ship building and Hull maintenance. The award is done twice every year by credit transfer. The College of Air Warfare, Secunderabad is recognised as a centre for providing instruction for the award of M.A. Degree in Political science and strategic studies by credit transfer. Officers trained at Indian Air force academy, Dindigul are being awarded PG Diploma in Management by credit transfer. In addition, several officers of Indian Air Force and navy were given admission to Ph.D. Programmes in different branches of their interest. Andhra University also awards Technical Diploma in about 26 trades by credit transfer to Airmen quantifying the training they get during their service in various Air Force Establishments which will strengthen their qualification for placement after discharge from the defence services. Andhra University in association with the Directorate General of Resettlement offered Diploma Course in Disaster and safety Management, Certificate course in Cyber Security, certificate course in Marine electrical and Navigational electronics and certificate course in Yoga during the year 2020-2021. In addition the centre awards B.A. (HRM) Degree to jawans in association with Kendriya Sainik Welfare board through a Memorandum of Understanding. The centre for defence studies contemplates to expand the activities into defence research programmes and for direct instruction in Defence Technology and strategic studies and efforts are on in this direction.

11. International Affairs

International Students

The International Affairs wing of Andhra University started functioning way back in late Nineties'. It has an Advisory Board headed by Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor as Chairman and Dean, International affairs as Convener. International Affairs Office is being headed by Dean to look after the International, NRI, PIO and OCI admissions in different UG, PG, Ph.D, Diploma and other programs offered by University. Supernumerary seats of 15% to foreigners and 5% to NRIs/PIOs/OCIs are the Affiliated available in University Campus Colleges and also in Colleges in each course subject to eligibility.

A.G. Audit:

The Accountant General Audit party conducts test audit on the accounts of the University, whenever the accounts of the University are approved by the Executive Council that is sent to the Principal Accountant General with a request to conduct the Audit. As per the schedule, the AG Audit party will conduct the audit of the University.

The accounts of Andhra University have been audited by Inspection team of Principal Accountant General (P.A.G), A.P., Hyderabad for the last 5 years i.e., from 2014-15 to 2018-19 (upto 08/2019) and received Audit Inspection report consisting of 37 objection paras have been communicated to the concerned sections/offices stating to give replies with proper documents so as to submit the same to the O/o the Principal Accountant General for final review and settlement.

The replies to the pending 90 paras for the years (2003-04 to 2014-15) and 37 paras for 2019-20 have been obtained from the concerned wings, which is under process of finalization.

A.G. Audit Outstanding Objections:

There are 114 outstanding A.G. Audit objections pertaining to the years 2003-04, 2006-07 & 2014-15. These objections were also reviewed by the A.G. Audit team and 24 objections have been dropped by Senior Audit Officer, Office of the PAG (Audit), vide letter **No. PAG(AU/AP/AMG-I/EDI-III/U-II/2021-22, dt. 09-04-2021** and the rest of 90 objections are in review process.

State Audit:-

The State Audit Department is the statutory Auditor of the University. A Separate Audit wing has been allotted to the University for conducting the post audit of the University and this office is located in the campus besides the Central Administrative Office (C.A.O)

This Audit Body oversees the receipt and expenditure audit of all the University Accounts, Principal's Offices, Hostels, Library, Press & Publications, Dispensaries, Engineering wing, SDE and all other wings of the University. After completion of the audit, an audit report for the year will be issued and is also communicated to the State Government, through the Director of State Audit.

The State Audit Department also regulates the audit of Salaries and Pensions. If any discrepancies are noticed, they are communicated to the university for necessary rectification, recovery etc., The State Audit verifies the service registers and pay fixations of both teaching and non-teaching staff during wage revisions.

The Audit of University has been taken up by the State Audit Department and Completed upto the financial year 2018-19 and issued Audit Report for the FY 2018-19 and 2019-20 is in progress.
